Executive Board Participation and Other Communities – Mayor McAdams

- Draper City Addition to Executive Board for Phase II
 - Mayor Dolan moved that Mayor Troy Walker of Draper City be invited to participate on the Executive Board with voting rights beginning in Phase II and with their financial support. Mike Allegra seconded. All voted in favor, with none opposed.

Cottonwood Negotiation Task Force Update – Buck Swaney

- Vail/ Talisker has been added with regards to land they own in Big Cottonwood Canyon
- Had first meeting on December 5th, will have 3 additional meetings between now and end of January to develop a final recommendation to the Executive Board
- Mayor McAdams noted that the willingness to make significant land use changes depends on the scale of transportation investments
- Chris Robinson suggested another group to look at Wasatch Back issues. Laynee will follow up with Chris Robinson and Andy Beerman.

Transportation Purpose & Proposed Actions

- Laynee reviewed the big picture context from Ogden to Provo
- Jeff reviewed what we will move forward with in 2015

- Proposed action to begin EIS on rail/bus fixed-guideway transit from Salt Lake Valley, Little Cottonwood, to Park City, with potential end points at Little Cottonwood, Big Cottonwood, or Park City
- See powerpoint presentation for more details
- Discussion on issues to bring forward to public and gather feedback:
 - Include metrics from system groups
 - Describe options for alignments in Little Cottonwood, like quarry trail (not feasible alignment), alignments on/near road, alignments out of avalanche paths
 - Describe alignment options in Park City, or at least criteria for routes such as avoiding impacts to historic areas
 - Explain to the public what is possible, range of alternatives for NEPA
 - No action is a possible scenario
 - Opening guardsman pass road to year-round traffic is an option the Executive Board does not support (see framework document from December 2014 Exec Board meeting)
 - Short term solutions can proceed (Mountain Accord Executive Board approval is not needed for short term solutions that are already underway)
 - Mountain Accord will recommend some short term/immediate actions (such as private shuttle in Millcreek)

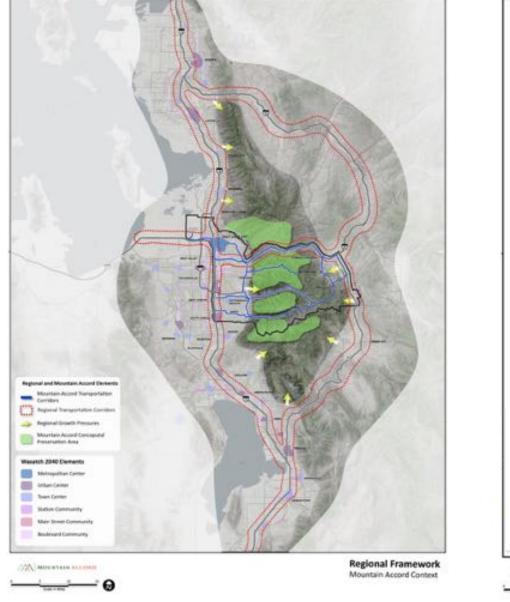

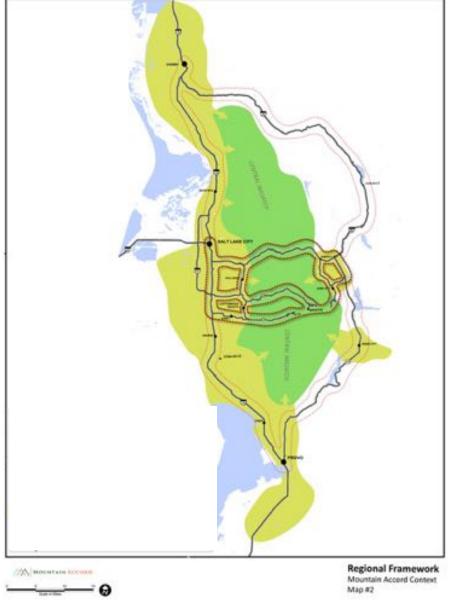

MOUNTAIN ACCORD

Transportation I-80 from Salt Lake City to Kimball Junction

Potential transit improvements in the I-80 corridor (including on SR 224) are intended to address the following purposes:

- Provide transit options for residents, employees, and visitors in congested corridors
- Provide competitive transit service between the airport and Park City/Snyderville Basin
- Reduce congestion problems at Kimball Junction (SR 224/I-80)
- Reduce adverse impacts of parking on land use, economy, safety and environmental quality, (Park City and SR 224)
- Connect economic nodes with reliable and fast transit service to support concentrated development and reduce sprawl

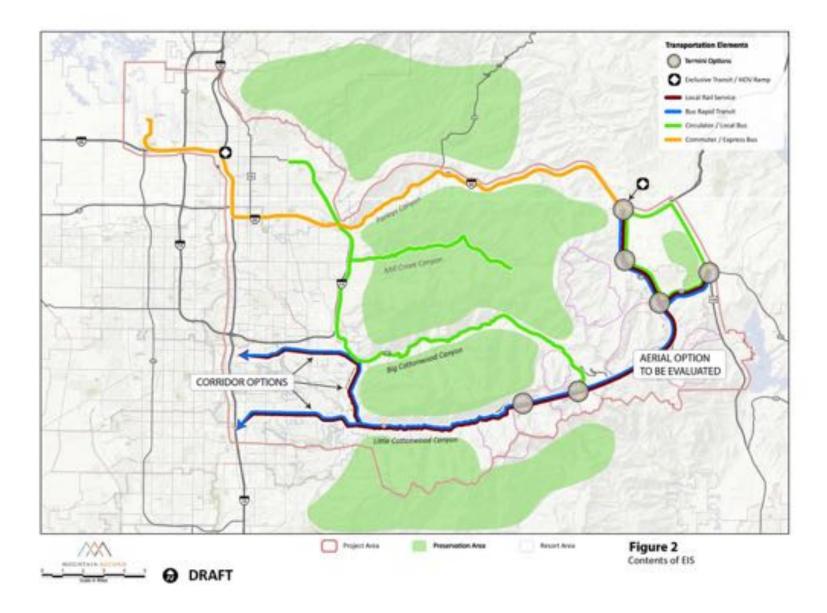


Transportation Salt Lake Valley to LCC/BCC and Park City

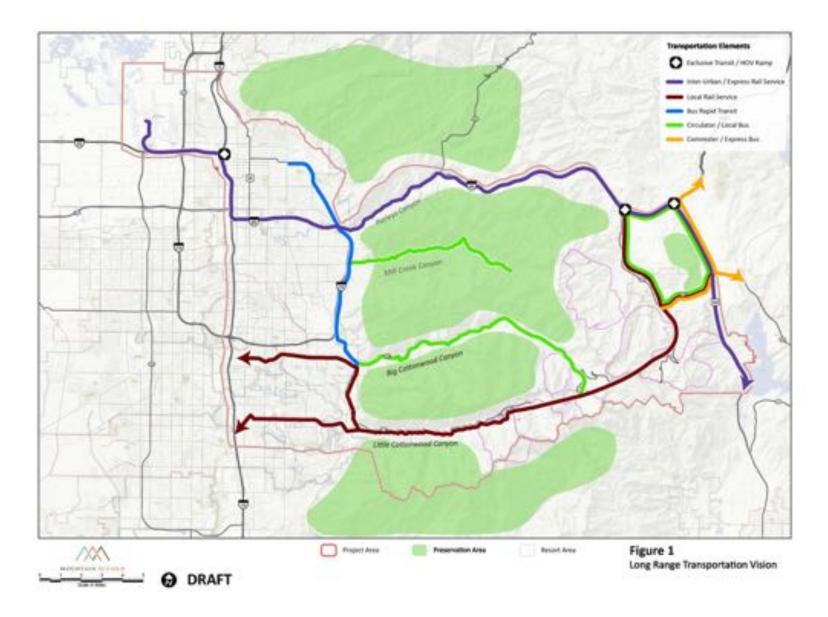
Potential transit improvements in the LCC/BCC to Park City corridor are intended to address the following purposes:

- Provide reliable and safe year-round transportation options
- Reduce auto use and congestion in the Cottonwood Canyons
- Provide evacuation options from the Cottonwood canyons
- Increase trips via alternative modes to and from mountain destinations
- Decrease growth in Vehicle Miles Travelled (VMT)
- Reduce adverse impacts of parking
- Create unique, marketable, attractive mountain transportation experience
- Connect economic nodes with reliable and fast transit service
